Message from Reverend John Calvin Rhoad Jr.

New Testament: 1 Corinthians 12:12–31

"The body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Jesus Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body — Jews or Greeks, slaves or free — and we were all made to drink of one Spirit. Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many.

If the foot would say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be?

If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as God chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many members, yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you."

On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and those members of the body that we think less honourable we clothe with greater honour, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honour to the inferior member, that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honoured, all rejoice together with it.

Now you are the body of Jesus Christ and individually members of it. And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers; then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? No, but strive for the greater gifts. And I will show you a still more excellent way.

For the Sake of His Love, Acceptance & Forgiveness

Sixty million cells. Thirty-six million heartbeats a year. Three hundred billion red blood cells are produced every day. Sixty thousand miles of blood vessels in each body. The human body! A complex, miraculous system!



The human body, the Apostle Paul declares, is the Christian community.

And Paul was not talking about just any body, he was talking about Jesus Christ's body. A holy body. The holiest body. Paul told his community they were to be the "*body*" that Jesus would be if He was physically present.

"The body of Jesus Christ" almost sounds cliché. We may have heard that we are "*the body of Jesus Christ*" so often that we hardly pay attention

to it. But think about the magnitude of what the Apostle Paul is saying. Sit for a moment, reflect on the analogy?!

You are — we are — the body of Jesus Christ! Wow!

There are 100 billion neurons in the brain. There are 54 bones in your hands. Twenty-five million new cells are being produced every second. The body is constantly changing, interconnected, and designed for life.

For Christians, for all of us as followers of Jesus, an important purpose of life is love, acceptance, and forgiveness as Jesus taught.

Jesus modeled love, acceptance, and forgiveness throughout His earthly life to everyone that He met. Jesus' design and purpose perfectly emulated God's mercy and grace. So, as we interpret this reality, we correctly understand that our body holds the same physical design as Jesus Christ's body.

Our church, as the body of Jesus Christ, is meant to faithfully join God's loving outreach in mission and ministry this year, and every year, with acceptance, mercy, joy, forgiveness, and grace.

Despite all that has happened over the past year, we are called to forge ahead - the central call is to love, accept, and forgive others as Jesus Christ modelled and mandated for us. We are — the body of Jesus Christ!



What does that mean?

Well... Jesus reached out His hand and touched people who needed healing. He was accepting of who they were as a part of God's creation. Jesus laid His hands on those who were sick and dying and extended forgiveness to sinners. Jesus ate with people no one else dared associate with – this is true love. Then Jesus – with His voice, He told stories — insightful parables that changed people's hearts! Then Jesus, with his ears, He listened to the yearning of countless souls. Then Jesus got down on His knees to wash His disciples' feet and brought children onto His knees to teach a lesson about what's important.

Yes, Jesus sweated and relentlessly prayed in the garden of suffering – named Gethsemane. Jesus stretched His arms on the cross. Jesus accepted – Jesus forgave – and Jesus loved. Even there, there at the end of it all, Jesus appeared to His Disciples to show them that new life is possible!

Jesus used His whole being to send us an eternal, everlasting message – a statement for love, acceptance, and forgiveness.

It was the Apostle Paul who wrote in this passage and stated:

"You are the body of Jesus Christ."

Because the Apostle Paul clearly realized and understood, God's greater message resounding throughout all of creation.

So, may it be for all of us, in all that we say and in all that we do, let us believe collectively, accept, and know with God's love and forgiveness that:

We are the body of Jesus Christ!

Yes, may we continue forward, both individually, but also importantly, collectively, as the church – challenged to share the truth that has been revealed to us in God's Word and greet others in our community with love, acceptance, and forgiveness!

God be praised. Amen.
